# CELEBRATE NATIONAL TRAILS DAY - STILLHOUSE HOLLOW PRESERVE – JUNE 7 - Parks Committee

Join us to learn more about the natural features, native plants, and resident and migratory birds that inhabit this NW Austin suburban setting. Jane Tillman is a Capital Area Master Naturalist and a Travis Audubon member who regularly visits Stillhouse and has recorded 86 bird species there. Mark Sanders of the Wildland Conservation Division is a cave species specialist who will discuss the geographic features of the preserve and the fauna that live there. Stillhouse Hollow presents a snapshot of the challenges that endangered species face in suburban habitat. The preserve is located at 7810 Sterling Drive, just off Burney Drive.

8:00 hike: This hike will involve some off trail portions including steep terrain. It will be a moderate to rugged hike. Suitable for ages 14 and up.

9:00 scavenger hunt: A self-guided scavenger hunt will take parents and kids along the trails at Stillhouse Hollow to find some of the treasures inside this park. This excursion will stay on the paths and involve easy walking, and the kids can explore the park as much as they want!

9:30 hike: Enjoy an easy stroll with minor elevation gain. This hike is suitable for ages 10 and up. Participants under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a guardian.

**Be Aware:** Participants are encouraged to wear closed-toe hiking-appropriate shoes for protection. Participants may wish to bring binoculars. Sun protection such as sunscreen and hats are strongly recommended. Participants must bring drinking water. No drinking water will be provided. Smoking, pets, and collecting of plant materials are not permitted.

On May 17, we gathered 15 volunteers at our first workday to spruce up Murchison Pool. We mulched all of the trees, picked up trash that had accumulated there, and cleaned up the pool to get it ready for the summer. This is the first step in rejuvenating the pool.

Next, we will begin to work on making the pool a more inviting place. This will require shade structures, picnic tables, and benches at minimum. An intentional landscape design will hopefully transform the pool into more of a community gathering place (not just for fire ants!).

This will no doubt take a few years to complete. In the meantime, we are taking some small steps to get there. We have three new picnic tables on order that will provide some much needed seating around the pool. We are also working with a landscape designer to come up with a design concept.

# **NWACA ANNUAL MEETING RECAP**

Thanks, everyone, who came to the May 21 NWACA Annual Meeting. There was an excellent turnout; we hope to see even more neighbors next year!

Vince Torres, AISD School Board President gave a very informative keynote.. He talked about the facilities plans (especially those at high schools that will be supporting the multiple student plans available now), the AISD tax rates (second lowest in the area and how raising them sends most of the money out of our area because of the Robin Hood arrangement), the master plan for the district, the superintendent search, and the AISD trustee elections in the fall. NWACA residents vote for AISD District 4 and for the at-large

position. In the Q&A segment, he answered questions about the crowded schools in both of the verticals that serve our neighborhood, gave more details about the tax rates, and talked about his interest in getting changes made to the redistribution of our tax monies around the State.

Mr. Torres was followed by talks on areas of specific focus for NWACA this year – 10-1 City Council Elections, Neighborhood Watch for Crime Prevention, Parks and Trails Development, and Wildfire Prevention. # **HELIPAD PERMIT UNDER DISCUSSION**

The owner of an approximately 40-acre residential property located at 5501 Paradox Cove submitted a conditional use permit application for a helipad on January 16, 2014. The site is located on the east side of Bull Creek as it enters Lake Austin. (As you drive west on 2222, you will see the entrance into the site from 2222, just before you get to the County Line Restaurant. Many people know the location as the Design Center.)

The property is currently used as a single-family residence with guest houses and a small recreation center for family use. The site is zoned Planned Unit Development (PUD) with Lake Austin Single Family Residential as the base zoning. The PUD Agreement for the site does not include helipad as a permitted use nor does the PUD site plan show a helipad.

Helipads are conditional uses in all commercial, industrial, and special purpose base districts and not permitted at all in residential base districts, except for hospitals in residential districts.

On April 29<sup>th</sup> the NWACA Zoning Committee met with the owner's representatives regarding the conditional use permit. The owner's representatives stated that the owner had a business in California and was building another home there and so needed to use a helicopter to get to the airport. The helicopter would be based at the airport and flights would be limited to 14 operations (seven back and forth trips) a week, on a use it or lose it basis (no "banking" of trips). Flights would be limited to between 7:30 am and 8:30 pm. Noise would be limited to 65 Ldn. (Ldn is the average sound level, in decibels (dB), for a 24 hour period. Non-averaged helicopter noise is, of course, considerably louder than 65 dB.)

The owner's representative showed a map depicting the proposed approach and departure paths of the helicopter. The paths generally follow Lake Austin. However, that cannot be guaranteed depending on wind conditions. The owner's representative addressed the zoning issue by stating that the PUD zoning did not prohibit the proposed helipad use because PUD is a special district and helipads are conditional uses in special districts.

The site plan application expires on August 16, 2014, however the applicant can get a six month extension. The applicant just submitted his sound study which will be reviewed by the NWACA Zoning Committee. # **COYOTE DENNING SEASON IS UPON US**

Texas Wildlife Services is reminding the Austin community that this is the time of year when Coyotes are more on the move in our area. In general, that's because some of them have had pups or are about to have pups, and they are on the prowl for food and water. Their aggression level goes up especially toward dogs, because they're protecting their pups. We've had numerous reports from NWACA neighbors about sightings of coyotes on the streets and in yards, as well as of seeing coyotes attacking other wild animals. If you see a coyote, call 3-1-1 to report its location; Texas Wildlife Services will be alerted.

# "SCOOP THE POOP" SIGNS AVAILABLE AT JULY 4 POST-PARADE EVENT



Some of our neighbors have expressed an interest in yard signs that remind dog-walkers to pick up after their dogs. The City of Austin has provided us small free yard signs that can be used to remind our friends to 'scoop the poop' as they walk their dogs.

# CALL IT IN! REPORT INCIDENTS TO 311 OR 911

Establishing Neighborhood Watches throughout the NWACA area helps our entire community by putting more "eyes and ears" on our blocks and streets. However, that helps only if neighbors know what to look for and take action when they see something suspicious. We strongly encourage neighbors to trust their instincts - when in doubt, CALL IT IN!

#### Watch for

- Suspicious persons or activities
- Vehicles passing by numerous times, suspiciously parked, or appearing to be aimlessly cruising
- Strangers in the neighborhood, especially if they are loitering with cell phones and/or backpacks
- Teenagers who are hanging out in the neighborhood while school is in session
- People with flyers or handouts. They may be casing the neighborhood, looking for easy targets
- The person "taking a short-cut" through a yard
- Strange vehicles parked at your neighbor's house

If you see something suspicious, don't assume someone else has called the police. It is your neighborhood – if you see something you feel is suspicious take action and do something about it. Note the description of the suspicious person and/or vehicle and call the City immediately at 3-1-1.

If you see an actual crime in progress, immediately phone the Emergency number 9-1-1 and report the incident to the police. Do not confront any suspicious persons yourself or attempt an arrest, as your safety could be jeopardized. Call the police!


NWACA's Crime and Safety Committee shares reports of crime or suspicious activity with neighborhood watch programs in surrounding areas as well as with APD. The more descriptive information we get on file, the better the chances that a neighbor may see and report a crime in progress, and the better the chances that APD can arrest criminals in our neighborhoods.

Finally, summer is upon us, and many will go on vacation in coming months. Before you leave town, exchange work and vacation schedules with a neighbor you trust, so you can keep an eye on each other's homes.

# ONE MORE MONTH OF CAUTION ABOUT OAK WILT

You've surely seen NWACA's Prevent Oak Wilt signs and newsletter notices for the last few months. The sap beetle that can transmit oak wilt is believed to become less active in the heat of Summer, but that doesn't mean pruning oaks before December is risk-free. Take advantage of the Summer months to evaluate your trees and plan pruning, removal or replacement planting for the winter.





#### REMINDER – FIREWORKS ARE NOT ALLOWED INSIDE THE CITY OF AUSTIN – Austin Fire Department

The sale and use of fireworks is banned entirely in Austin, as is the possession of fireworks within 5,000 feet outside the City limits. Violations can bring a fine of up to \$500. If fireworks cause bodily harm and/or property damage, the Austin Fire Department can charge residents with assault and arson, both felony crimes. The US Department of Transportation does not classify sparklers, smoke bombs, glow worms, snakes and poppers as common fireworks, and their use is allowed within the City.

#### BENEFITS OF A MODERN LIBRARY CARD

NWACA wants to remind our members about a great local resource --- **the library!** Does the library remind you of school days researching projects using micro-fiche and the Dewey Decimal System and a card catalog on paper? Our local library is a modern resource that has many current popular books, DVD and Blu-Ray movies, and CDs. Our library allows users to check out electronic resources as well, including audio books or Kindle versions of books that can be read on a tablet, as well as a module that allows users to read electronic versions of certain magazines for FREE.

Do you have a library card? If not, please stop by and support the local library and sign up. If there is an item that you are interested in checking out, you don't even need to step foot into the library to look for it. The library has tools that allow users to search for items online and have them delivered to a local branch for pickup. This means that even if the item you want is not located at our local branch, it can be sent there for you to pick up at a later date. With the ability to select items from many branches, almost any item you are looking for can be available for you to enjoy.

Do you or your children devour books? Check out the library's online service called Overdrive; it allows users to read electronic books or hear audio books on a computer, tablet or smart phone. Overdrive can be accessed from anywhere in the world, so when you are on vacation and finish your book mid-trip, you can hop on Overdrive and order a new one in a matter of minutes. The Guide to Overdrive provides device-specific assistance, which is a helpful approach considering that Kindles, Apple, and Android devices all have slightly different requirements. Do you eye all the glossy magazine covers at the grocery checkout lane? Check out the library's online magazine service partnered with Zinio to read copies of a wide variety of popular magazines, including magazines for children. #### DROUGHT-RESISTANT LANDSCAPE OF THE MONTH - 7111 Sungate Drive

This series highlights a homeowner's yard with successful drought-resistant landscaping. We welcome references from readers for examples they appreciate and would like to share with our readers.

Featuring Yard of: Idee Kwak

Address: 7111 Sungate Drive
Year started: 2006, developed gradually

**Prominent Features:** Handcrafted "rivers" in front

and back yard to channel water through the property, a plethora of Texas native plants, and an evolving painted forest landscape in

the back yard

**Reasons for Choice**: This yard catches water from

the about four acres of the

neighborhood where landscapes are much higher than this one. The ensuing flood from a strong rain now flows through the beautifully crafted rivers to a tank and pipes that eventually take the water to the City drainage system. The native plants throughout the landscape are the result of working with designer/author Scott Ogden, to lay out a pleasing arrangement that requires minimal water, is deer-resistant, and attracts

butterflies and caterpillars.

Water Requirements: Zero to once per month during a drought, using a drip system



**Lessons Learned**: Plant natives, and if they don't do well, don't do that again! Mulching chokes natives; they prefer decomposed granite. Be sure that what is planted will take care of itself. Avoid St. Augustine and anything else that takes a lot of water.

**Plant List:** agave, coreopsis, damianita, germander, Jerusalem sage, lambs ear, lantana, mealy blue sage, Mexican oregano, pink skullcap, ponyfoot, purple sage, rock penstemon, rosemary, sago palm, society garlic, stool, various grasses, and more. In addition there are iris and other native bulbs for the South, with thousands more to join the 2000 already planted

With this assistance, NWACA can reimburse forty percent of a pre-approved homeowner's expenses, up to a maximum \$1,000 reimbursement. NWACA policy requires that a property owner obtain an assessment of oak wilt infection, or risk of infection in healthy oaks, from an arborist with ASI oak wilt certification.

# FIREWISE TIP OF THE MONTH – MINIMIZE VEGETATION FLAMMABILITY

Each month we feature helpful information about ways to make your home more fire-adapted, better able to prevent wildfire destruction. The full set of tips is archived on the www.nwaca.org web site.

An 8-page pamphlet from the Texas Forest Service reminds us that "Fire-resistant does not mean fire-proof. Homeowners should maintain a healthy landscape with proper cleaning, pruning and watering. Put the right plant in the right place." "Firewise Landscaping in Texas" addresses these topics: the right plants for the right place, reasons to maintain a Firewise landscape, choosing landscape design elements, characteristics of fire-resistant plants, creating defensible space in landscape design, working with completing landscape goals, a checklist for Firewise plant characteristics, and checklist for landscaping your home. Included in its guidance are suggestions for the types of plants in the wildfire defensible zone around your home:



- acceptable in first 10 feet low growing, moist plants such as columbine, primrose, violet, and phlox
- 10 to 30 feet from the house taller plants like asters, bluebonnet, bluebells, and gayfeather
- Beyond 30 feet shrubs like beautyberry, butterfly bush, lantana, and turks cap

HOVER FLIES - Wizzie Brown

Each month we feature helpful information from the Texas AgriLife Extension Service Program, provided by Program Specialist Wizzie Brown.

Hover flies, also known as syrphid flies or flower flies, are bee and wasp mimics. You can tell that they are flies because they only have two wings (bees and wasps have four wings). They can range in size from ¼ to ¾ an inch long. Most are black with yellow markings and wings are held out to the side when at rest.

Hover flies are great fliers and are capable of hovering or even flying backward. Adults and larvae are considered beneficial; adults because they help to pollinate plants and larvae for feeding on aphids and other insects. Hoverflies cannot sting.



Hover flies have complete metamorphosis with 4 life stages- egg, larva, pupa and adult. Females lay whitish-grey oblong eggs singly near aphids. Larvae are legless and carrot shaped. The larvae may vary in color but most have a stripe running the length of the back. Pupae are pear shaped and typically found on the plant or soil surface. There can be up to 7 generations per year.

Adult flies feed on pollen and nectar and may also be attracted to honeydew which is caused by sucking insects such as aphids, mealybugs and scale insects. Adults are typically found around flowers. Larvae feed on aphids and other small, soft-bodied insects. Larvae move along the plant surface looking for prey. When they find something, they grasp it, suck it dry and discard the skin. Pupae are non-feeding.

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# REMINDER ABOUT NOT FEEDING THE DEER

Some new neighbors may not be aware that feeding deer is prohibited in Austin. If you see someone feeding deer, let them know that it's bad for the deer, and it's a violation of a City ordinance. If the feeding persists, you can report it by calling 3-1-1. The Code Compliance Department will send someone to talk with the neighbor.
