Wildlife Management Committee Effort

Overall Approach of Committee

- Determine how people and deer can best live together in NWACA
- Identify ways to attain a healthy balance

Reasons for Many Deer in Neighborhoods

- Lack of rain in greenbelts (3-year drought)
- Feeding of deer by residents
- Growth of herds, in response to feeding

Committee Education Activities

- Materials gathered and distributed at recent annual meetings
- Materials helped support City of Austin <u>No Feeding Ordinance for</u>
 <u>Deer</u>, adopted February, 2009
- Growing collection of articles available on NWACA web site

Wildlife Management Survey – 3/2010

Purposes of the survey

- Check on effect of the No Feeding Ordinance
- Gather current concerns about deer from residents.
- Establish baseline data on the impact of deer in NWACA
- Survey Dates 3/17/10 3/31/10
- 1224 Surveys distributed
 - 91 sent via U.S. Mail to members: 32 responded by 4/3
 - 1133 sent via Email survey links; 343 responded
- Total of 375 responses = 30.6%
- Most responses from Northwest Hills, Highland Hills, North Cat Mountain, Cat Mountain, Vista West


Intended Use of Survey Results

- Enable NWACA residents to understand impact of current imbalance of deer
 - Safety impact to residents
 - Travel by foot, bicycle, cars
 - Ability to freely navigate own yards
 - Health impact to residents
 - Prevalence of deer droppings
 - Concern about ticks conveying Lyme Disease
 - Impact to landscape and wilderness areas
 - Financial impact to residents
- Provide to City Council or others we need to inform
- Encourage other neighborhoods to also gather data
- Build consensus with the community for next steps


Key Messages from Survey Responses

- NWACA has many deer in the neighborhood
 - 2/3 of the respondents see more than 10 deer per week
 - Where there is (or was) feeding, there are more deer
- More than 90% of respondents know about the nofeeding ordinance
 - Feeding has been significantly reduced
 - Few official complaints are filed; only 2 citations issued to date
- Health and safety impacts are high
 - Close encounters with cars are often reported
 - Dead deer are very common
- Financial impact to NWACA residents is high
 - Conservative estimate is \$500,000/year or \$100/household/year


Subdivision Response (375 total)

Complaints and Citations are Rare



Types of Impact from Deer





Examples provided in the survey explaining >\$500 impact

- \$ 1,000 yard damage
- \$ 3,000 car damage
- \$ 9,000 landscape damage
- \$ 255,000 property no longer saleable


Questions Asked in the Survey - 1

- 6. If you filed a complaint, do you know if a citation has been issued?


Questions Asked in the Survey - 2

- 13. Are you experiencing problems with feral hogs?


Aware of No-Feeding Ordinance




About 2/3 See 10 Deer or More Per Day




Deer Seen by Location




Feeding of Deer by Location

Cost by Location




Other Suggested Education Topics

Future NWACA Problem? Feral Hogs



Selection from Comments on Cost

- I would say about \$255,000.00 They have eaten all our plants and no one is going to buy a place that they could not walk to the swimming pool without stepping in deer poop. It also is unhealthy to have water washing through the poop into our yards and elsewhere on our property.
- Impossible to accurately estimate the high cost of the destruction of previously undisturbed or previously restored natural habitat on our property or in Barrow and other preserve areas that is due to the excessive browsing and traffic from a rapidly growing deer population.
- We back up to the Barrow Preserve and they have eaten the understory there to such an extent that there are NO NEW seedlings growing there at all (no oaks, no cedars) - the paths they wear are visible everywhere. If their population grown is not curtailed, we will have no replenishment of the native habitats in the preserve, severely affecting other birds and wildlife that would be living there ...

Health and Safety Selections

- Their droppings in the yard prevent my grandchildren from playing safely there.
- I think they are bringing a fungus to our yard. They sleep in our yard, and it is creating dead patches of grass.
- Last Monday I walked out my gate and found in a small area of grass 43+ piles of deer poop.. All sizes from pebbles to the size of a large dog. There is no way you could let children or pets play in the area.
- A buck had its antlers caught in a soccer net at Murchison's track in the early morning, and we called various agencies to find help including 311, 911, Wildlife Rescue, and AISD police.

Selections Favorable to the Deer

- It was a positive until all the new people moved in and ruined it! They used to be a plus to my property values!!!
- This year the freeze caused more damage to my landscape than the deer!
- I enjoy having the deer around, I think it adds class to the neighborhood and I have not experienced many negative effects
- DELIGHTED by the Deer!!!!
- I have no problem with the rights of wildlife appearing and interacting with the environment in the neighborhood. It is we humans who are encroaching on their natural habitat. Live and let live.
