








Started July, 2017


- Travis County Constable, Precinct 2
- ➢Our officer: Sgt. Sam Lindsey
- ➤ General flow
 - Patrols several times per week
 - 15-25 hours per month at \$45/hour+\$25/vehicle
 - Focuses on speeding, stop sign violations on major streets and around schools
 - Assists APD as needed, when in the area





Wildfire Simulation


- Two scenarios to be examined now







How does it spread?




- Beetles and other vectors carry fungal spores from infected trees to fresh, open wounds on healthy oaks
- Tree-to-tree spread of pathogen through interconnected or grafted root systems, once an oak wilt center becomes established









What can YOU do about it?

PREVENTION

- Resident education (Best Practices)
- Proper pruning (FEB thru JUNE)
- Proper firewood usage
- Optimize COA Impact Activities (AE pruning, SWS brush pickups)
- Plant trees other than Live Oaks or Red Oaks
- Employ Certified Arborists also, check Better Business Bureau

RESPONSE ACTION

- Trenching
- Inject Infected tree
- Remove Infected tree (especially Red Oaks)

Live Oak symptoms





- Veinal Necrosis (brown veins)
- Leaf vein turns brown while rest of leaf remains green
- Leaves may remain on tree or fall to ground

Red Oak symptoms





- Leaves turn pale green then brown remain attached for weeks
- Color change can begin on one branch and quickly engulf tree
- Red Oak trees generally die within 4-6 weeks


About the Loop 360 Program

- Program purpose: Upgrade multiple intersections to improve mobility and safety along the corridor.
- Projects include:
 - Westlake Drive
 - Spicewood Springs Road
 - Lakewood Drive
 - Courtyard Drive/RM 2222
 - Walsh Tarlton Lane
 - Lost Creek
 Boulevard/Westbank
 Drive
 - RM 2244




Spicewood Springs Road

- Existing mainlane signal at Spicewood Springs Road (E)/Bluffstone Drive replaced with mainlane overpass with non-signalized U-turns.
- Existing signal at Spicewood Springs Road (W) and existing crossover at northern intersection of Loop 360 at Winding Ridge Boulevard removed.



Courtyard Drive/RM 2222

- Existing interchange at RM 2222 reconfigured to a diverging diamond intersection.
- Existing mainlane signal at Courtyard Drive replaced with mainlane underpass.
- Northbound exit ramp replaced with northbound braided ramps.
- Southbound entrance ramp replaced with southbound braided ramps.


