

Cairn burial drawing, Texas Beyond History

There are scores of archeological sites – prehistoric and historic within our NWACA neighborhood. But one in particular captures the imagination; it is associated with a woman who called our neighborhood home some 1,600 years ago.

In 1970 - 1971, the Texas Highway Department (today's Tx-DOT) carried out archeological excavations along the route that

Healthy and Play Streets in Austin

Modern Americans usually think of streets as places for cars. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, more than two out of every three Americans commute to work by car, even in the post-COVID-19 age of telecommuting(1), but here in Northwest Austin, our streets offer much more. Neighbors walk their dogs, kids ride bikes, and families take evening strolls.

Recognizing this pattern across Austin, the City has developed the "Living Streets" program.(2) This program aims to reclaim our streets for the people who live here, turning them into spaces for walking, biking, gathering, and connecting. The program features two key components: "Healthy Streets" and "Play Streets."

"Healthy Streets" is a simple, yet effective concept. With just a few cones, barrels, and signs, the City can transform local streets into safer, more inviting spaces for pedestrians and cyclists. These

modifications discourage through-traffic, making the streets safer for all users. The program is temporary, ranging from three to six months depending on the community's interest and needs. While through-vehicles are still allowed on Healthy Streets, the program reduces vehicle volumes and speeds.

"Play Streets" is all about fun and togetherness. This initiative, also temporary in duration, allows residents with help from the city, to partially close a single block to motor vehicle traffic for up to three days per week, for up to 12 hours per day, creating a safe space for children and adults to play and socialize. Imagine kids playing tag, neighbors chatting, and impromptu street parties all outside your door!

Many Austinites have already experienced the benefits of these programs. In the Wooten neighborhood, locals on Wooten Drive have implemented the Healthy Streets initiative and have seen a reduction in through-traffic and slower driving speeds.(3) Although the changes are temporary, the hope is that they spark lasting im-

provements in driving behavior and street usage. Not all streets are eligible for the program, and any successful Healthy Street activation requires the buy-in of at least 60% of adjacent parcels.

The NWACA Transportation Committee wants to help you bring this program to our neighborhood. If you are interested, please email info@nwaca.org for more information, and we can help you through the steps to evaluate whether this program is a good fit for your street. While the most recent round of applications closed in October, there will be new opportunities to apply in early 2025. We look forward to hearing about the first successful Healthy Street in Northwest Austin!


Neighbor Tip: Rules for 4-Way Stops

Throughout the neighborhood, there appear to be both young and experienced drivers who find 4-way stops to be confusing. These simple rules apply:

- Each vehicle (including bicycles) must stop at a 4-way stop before proceeding.
- Each vehicle (including bicycles) must yield to pedestrians crossing the intersection.
- Each driver who intends to turn at the intersection must signal that intention.
- If one vehicle arrives at the stop before another, that first vehicle has the right to proceed first.

- If two vehicles arrive at the stop at the same time and they are side by side, the rightmost vehicle has the right to proceed first.
- If two vehicles arrive at the stop at the same time and are facing each other, if one is going straight through and the other is turning, the one going straight through has the right to proceed first. If one is turning right and one is turning left, the one turning right has the right to proceed first. If both are turning in the same direction, each can proceed, since their paths won't cross.
- If three vehicles arrive at the same time, the rightmost vehicle
 has the right to proceed first, no matter what direction each is
 facing. Remaining vehicles follow the rules above.
- If four vehicles arrive at the same time, drivers will determine which has the right of way; there is no specific rule.



APD solves crimes with new license plate reader program

The Public Safety Commission was briefed a month ago on some early results of the license plate reader program that rolled out in March with cameras at undisclosed sites across the city.

The Austin Police Department credits the cameras for the 40 arrests patrol officers made for stolen vehicles and the 20 stolen vehicles recovered with no arrests. Additionally, police investigators identified and arrested two murder suspects and one aggravated

robbery suspect, APD said. The use of the cameras also generated nine leads in other felony cases.

The LPR program's 40 cameras, geographically distributed across Austin, went live in March. APD retains the captured data for seven days, which the department says is the shortest retention period of any law enforcement agency in the country. City Council added the seven-day rule in response to local controversy regarding the program.

All sworn personnel were to be trained on the cameras' software

by the end of October.

"I'm excited to see some success coming from (the program), especially as somebody who was somewhat skeptical of the process," vice chair Timothy Ruttan said. He asked for APD to return next month with some "balancing measures" that would show the number of police stops that did not result in an arrest or recovered vehicle.



would be disturbed by building Loop 360. These excavations are called "salvage excavations." They are done ahead of the proverbial and literal bulldozer to try to salvage information associated with sites before they are destroyed. One discovery was a "cairn burial," not far from Bull Creek on the northwestern boundary of our neighborhood under what is now Loop 360.

What is a "cairn burial?" From Texas Beyond History, a public education website of the Texas Archeological Research Lab (TARL) at UT Austin:

"The countless stone mounds dotting the low hills and flattopped mesas of west-central Texas have perplexed landowners and archeologists alike for more than a century. Known as "cairns," these mysterious arrangements of rock can be found by the hundreds—and perhaps thousands—along the rocky ridgelines and bluffs overlooking the broad valleys of the Brazos and Colorado rivers and the canyons of their tributaries. Area ranchers typically have referred to these large cairn clusters as "Indian burial grounds"—and with good reason. Many of the cairns have been found to contain human remains—men, women, and children who long ago were carefully interred in specially prepared graves."

Unlike a navigation cairn built of stacked stones, a cairn burial is a tomb or a set of walls dug into the ground, encircled with a row of vertical slabs protruding from the ground. The slabs are topped with a large slab and / or mound of rocks. The architecture varies, just as European burials in Texas cemeteries vary.

Because the skeletal remains were not complete, little can be said about the person buried there: probably a female, age at death 35 or older. Stature is also indeterminate based on remains. There was no indication of death due to trauma, but because of the fragmentary remains this, too, is uncertain. Indications are that she had degenerative bone disorder, typically in load bearing joints, no doubt due to hard work in life.

Based on the dart point found in the grave and radiocarbon dating, she likely lived here about 1,600 years ago, the Late Archaic period between A.D. 380-570, before the bow and arrow was invented in North America. Texas Beyond History says: "The bow and arrow replaced the atlatl [spear thrower] and dart [dart point] ... around 1300 years ago (A.D.

700). The new technology spread across much of North America around this time, although its precise origin is unknown."

While she would have lived here about 1,600 years ago, the site overall shows occupation from about 8,000 years ago through about 1,250 years ago; a roughly 7,500-year period. Regarding her tribe, Dr. Michael Collins points out that "The present territory of Central Texas was not the long-term ancestral homeland of any indigenous group for whom an ethnographic account exists. The ethnographically well-known Comanche, Apache, Wichita, Kiowa, and even the Tonkawa arrived in Central Texas just before or during the early European contact period." It may be that the concept of a "tribe" may be less appropriate for that time period than a "band" or just extended family unit.

While little is known about this lady, it is clear she was an early resident of the neighborhood. Given the effort required for a cairn burial, she was obviously someone loved.

Hart Lane Fatality Murder Arrest Made

On August 7 at approximately 2:36 a.m., Austin Police Department officers responded to a single vehicle crash in the 6800 block of Hart Lane. Andrew Fonseca Reyes was transported to a hospital and died the next day. The driver and two other passengers of the car left the scene.

Detectives identified that Jeremy Josue Giron Hernandez was the driver of the stolen vehicle that resulted in the crash that killed Reyes. On October 8 Giron Hernandez was arrested in Williamson County and charged with First Degree Murder.

Special fund could help Council respond to neighborhood

Under a proposal approved November 7, City Council members may have the ability next year to fund projects in their districts without following the usual planning and budgeting processes.

The resolution, sponsored by Council Member Vanessa Fuentes, directs the city manager to explore a pilot program to establish a special fund for each Council member to promptly respond to neighborhood needs, such as providing funding for sidewalk repairs or park improvements.

The funding program would take effect in the 2025-26 budget cycle. It's uncertain how much funding would be allotted for each district or how each project would be managed.

The resolution calls for the consideration of several factors regarding the allocation of funds, including equitable dispersion, areas of historical disinvestment, high-growth areas and alignment with the city's Capital Improvement Program.

As Fuentes explained before the vote, "This district service fund I believe is a great way for our offices to show tangible improvements in the neighborhoods that we serve. I also see it as a great way for us to build on the 10-1 system, especially as we approach the 10-year anniversary of having district representation throughout the city."

Co-sponsors of the item included Council members Ryan Alter, Paige Ellis and Zo Qadri, with Council members Chito

Vela and José Velásquez signing on at Thursday's meeting.

Council Member Natasha Harper-Madison said she would also like a better understanding of the status of resolutions that have been approved but not yet funded.

"Let's clear those out before we bring any more money asks," she said. "I think it's difficult for staff to be able to accommodate our requests when there is already a backlog." She added she would "lead by example" by not bringing forward additional resolutions that require funding until the backlog has been resolved.

Alter expressed enthusiasm for the proposal. Having immediate access to such a fund would expedite certain neighborhood-level safety improvement projects like speed bumps or protected crosswalks that have already been identified by staff but might be at the bottom of a lengthy to-do list managed by Transportation and Public Works.

"There are instances where there are other prioritizations that need to be made," he said.

The cities of San Antonio and Houston have established similar funding mechanisms for their city council offices, according to the resolution.

The Fuentes proposal lists a set of guardrails to be applied to ensure transparency regarding how the funding would be used. The city manager is expected to report back to Council with possible recommendations by March 1.

Kevin: Carol, you are recognized in the community not only as a successful businesswoman but also as a generous philanthropist. Your professional bio is available on the NWACA website. For this interview, let's focus more on your personal life.

Carol: I was born in Dallas. My parents split up when I was seven, which was difficult. Mom raised me and my brother, and on weekends we spent time with Dad.

Kevin: What was your favorite part of growing up?

Carol: I loved singing in high school musicals. I was very influenced by both my elementary and high school music instructors. Since then, I have sung in choirs, and I go every year to Broadway with a group of women; we spend a week seeing 7, 8, or even 9 shows!

Kevin: Please describe your transition from those early years to becoming successful in

Carol: After I graduated from UT, I moved to Houston and I worked two years in public relations for a real estate developer, Gerald Hines. I met and married Sandy Dochen, and our honeymoon was the drive to a very cold Washington DC, where Sandy started his job on Capitol Hill with Congressman Jake Pickle.

There, I found a job with an ad agency, and then became a public relations director for a real estate trade association. Sandy was born and raised in Austin, so when the Congressman asked him to come back to his hometown to run the congressional Austin office, the timing was right, as Sandy's mother was losing her struggle with lung cancer.

We moved directly into his parents' house on Far West Boulevard which they had built in 1967, and I took care of his mom for the last six weeks of her life, often staying up all night. That experience really changed me. I decided I wanted a career where I could help people in some way, and that

opportunity presented itself when I met a Dochen family friend, Irene Smith, who was a real estate broker. For the next 10 years she taught me everything. I then started my own real estate company, and in a blink, more than 40 years have passed.

We raised our 2 children in their grandparents' home close to Doss and Murchison, and eventually moved to a bigger house off Valburn Drive. And a year ago we became grandparents!

Kevin: Your bio says that you donate a percentage of your annual real estate income to Habitat for Humanity and Community First! Village.

Carol: To me, housing is everything! It creates stability in a person's life. Giving people a permanent home is one of the most important things we can do. Housing gives people a sense of security and responsibility and leads to better mental and physical health. Many may think I am in real estate sales, but I really think of myself as helping people with life's transitions.

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Duchen Prepares to Lead District 10 in NW Austin Northwest Austin News, December 2024 • Page 11

Although the race was extremely close, Marc Duchen claimed victory in the District 10 City Council contest over his only opponent, Ashika Ganguly. Duchen finished with 20,810 votes to Ganguly's 20,321, with only 489 votes separating the two.

"It hasn't entirely sunk in," shared Duchen in a Four Points News interview the week after he won the November 5 election.

In the head-to-head race to represent District 10 in Northwest Austin, the two well-educated and well-spoken candidates worked hard to win over voters in the second-wealthiest district of the city. District 8 in Southwest Austin has the highest median income in the city.

The new council members will be sworn in and seated on the dais in early 2025.

Duchen hit the ground running the day after the election, shifting gears from running his campaign and his business to now putting his company in hibernation mode and getting up to speed on District 10 concerns.

"I was running a business for the past 8 years, so

I'm shedding most of my clients and putting my business on hold," Duchen said.

Being a council member is a full time job and some estimate 50+ hours a week is average. The annual salary for council members is just over \$121,000.

Duchen is working on staffing and he expects his staff will include four to five people. The city of Austin expanded the pay to \$600,000 for district staff when the 10 district system was approved.

"Even with five staff, they will usually be working multiple positions... as District 10 serves nearly 100,000 people," he said.

Duchen is also meeting with various groups like Firewise and attending meetings with current and former council members. He is visiting with current council member Alison Alter and her staff.

"There's a learning curve to get familiar with things," Duchen said.

Duchen says he'll be working on a number of challenges in Northwest Austin which includes the 2222 corridor and as far west as Steiner Ranch, and River Place.

"There are a number of challenges," he said. "A

big one is infrastructure and traffic management out there. There's a lot of congestion and it's a public safety risk. We need comprehensive traffic solu-

Road expansions or widening and improving throughput where that makes sense along 620 and 2222 is one of Duchen's ideas.

He'd like to see more smart traffic light systems and improving timing of signals during peak times in the morning, afternoon and evening.

Duchen likes the idea of transit options like a bus stop and a dedicated route in the Northwest.

"Nothing in the city moves people east and west," he said and he wants to see that change.

Safety is another concern. For example, people in River Place have shared that police don't show up in a timely manner and they feel like they are not getting the response they need.

In some neighborhoods in District 10, Duchen has heard of an uptick in crime like with vehicle break ins.

Some crimes go unreported but he encourages residents to report crimes to the police because then resources are made available when areas need more

He wants to see more Austin Police Department district reps working with the communities. Those officers are supposed to be the first point of contact. The city cut APD community liaisons with budget cuts several years ago and now they are rebuilding those staffs again and re-engaging with the communities they serve. They are supposed to have quarterly meetings with their communities as well.

He cited that in the Baker sector, district reps and local police got involved to help curb speeding motorcycles along RM 2222. Resources were employed and solutions were being built out to address

Wildfire prevention is another initiative he is taking very seriously in District 10. Much of Northwest Austin is surrounded by parks, greenbelts, and preserve lands including the Balcones Canyonlands

"I will continue to support funding for wildfire prevention, fire safety, responsiveness, and readiness. I want to see enhanced wildfire strategies, towers with AI for detecting fires early, fire breaks, education, structural ignition zone evacuation strategies or SIZE, community outreach, and better responsiveness," Duchen said. "... because District 10 is all in high risk areas."

Kirk Watson avoids runoff, secures new term as Austin mayor

Kirk Watson has officially won a new term as Austin's next mayor.

Watson led his four challengers on November 5, but did not have enough votes to claim victory outright. He had to win a majority of the vote, or 50% plus one vote, to secure a new term and avoid a runoff.

After adding in overseas military ballots, certain domestic mail-in ballots and provisional ballots - which were counted through last week on November 12 - Watson had enough votes to avoid the runoff with Carmen Llanes Pulido, who had the second most votes.

Final tallies released last week on November 14 showed him to have earned 175,090 votes, about 13 votes over the threshold he needed to avoid a runoff. Those votes include tallies across Travis,

Williamson and Hays counties.

"I want to thank voters for their confidence in me, and for electing me to serve as Austin mayor for a 4th time," Watson said in a written statement. "We knew that winning outright, with no runoff, against four opponents in a presidential year would be extraordinary."

Llanes Pulido told KUT in a written statement she was waiting for an official tally from the three

"We owe it to Austinites who have made it clear that they want new and accountable leadership, to ensure that every single vote is accurately counted and every voice is heard," she said.

She said she has not decided if she will seek a

This will be the fourth time Austin has elected Watson as mayor.

Watson first served as mayor in 1997 and stepped down in 2001 to run for attorney general. He lost that race to Gov. Greg Abbott. He served in the Texas Senate for 13 years before running again for mayor in 2022. That race was decided in a runoff election against Celia Israel. He won with just 933 more votes than her.

Watson raised over \$1 million during his latest campaign - more than double his opponents' cash combined.

Under Watson's reign, the Austin City Council has made sweeping changes to the city's land code, opened and extended a temporary homeless shelter, and signed a five-year, \$218 million with the city's police union. He faced criticism for these efforts as well as a partnership with DPS to add patrols in the city.

Watson told KUT in a new term he and the council will remain focused on addressing affordability, workforce development and homelessness.

"Two years have gone by pretty fast and we have made enormous strides," Watson said. "In fact, a lot of people think when I came in that City Hall didn't move fast enough and was too slow and inefficient, and I think most people would agree now that it moves with a different speed and that we are getting things done. But we are not done."

When Watson was elected in 2022, his term was limited to two years. That was part of an effort to align mayoral races with presidential elections to increase voter turnout. Normally mayor and council members serve four-year terms.

Watson's new term will allow him the full four years.



Recycling and Thanksgiving

I recently had about 20 people over for dinner. I challenged myself to find a way to feed all these people while keeping my practice of composting and recycling. I used my collection of old and new stainless utensils instead of using plastic utensils. I used paper plates, as I happened to have an unopened package. Drinking glasses were also plastic, as I had a large collection of plastic glasses. I did provide a marker so everyone could write their name on their glass and not waste multiple glasses. Cleanup was easy. I placed a bowl with an open compost bag in the kitchen sink where we put the paper plates, food scraps, and paper napkins. I just threw the utensils in the dishwasher after dinner. Thanksgiving can be this easy. Use what you have in your house including your dishwasher. As you prepare your dinner, use your compost container. Vegetable skins, eggshells, turkey bones and skins, all belong in your compost bin. Relax and enjoy your company.

A problem some people have right now is what to do with your election yard signs. I used the **Recycle ATX** app, which I have mentioned before. At the bottom of the home page click "What do I do with...". I found that corrugated plastic signs cannot be placed in the blue recycling cart. These signs and the metal stakes used to place them in the ground must be taken to the Recycle and Reuse Drop-off Center. Cardboard signs are different from the corrugated signs. They can be recycled. The metal stakes still need to go to the Recycle and Reuse Drop-off Center. Or you can reuse the stakes and signs. Turn the signs inside out and use them for your next garage sale.

I find the **Recycle ATX** app especially important at this time of the year, as it informs me when my trash will be picked up when holidays fall on a Thursday. This app also reminds me when my Recycle Day occurs. The app is free and provides a lot of good information.

Writer's Corner: "Love is for the Birds"

"Love is for the Birds" is the third book published by Diane Owens Prettyman, following "Thin Places" and "Redesigning Emma".



An eco-friendly romantic adventure novel, "Love is for the Birds" had its book release on October 13 at the lovely Northwest Hills home of its author, Diane Owens Prettyman. Published by She Writes Press and distributed by Simon and Schuster, the book is what Kirkus calls "light, breezy, and comforting as a block of fudge."

The story opens in the aftermath of a hurricane that has destroyed much of South Padre. The residents of fictional Bird Isle grieve over the catastrophic devastation and emotional trauma of the storm which is based on 2017's Hurricane Harvey, the Texas Gulf Coast's "hurricane of the century."

The Amazon Net Galley Review tells us, "it accurately captures the visual devastation and emotional trauma of the residents of Bird Isle... Prettyman's main characters are grieving losses that we have all endured in one way or another: loss of a wife, mother, partner, relationship of a child, and through the hurricane, loss of property.

Teddy, who's lost her mother and her business, wisely realizes that loneliness is the common denominator. The


recovery efforts on Bird Isle and the residents' devotion to restoring the Aransas Wildlife Refuge for the annual arrival of the Whooping Cranes is Prettyman's backdrop. In the hurricane aftermath, this novel of second chances and life changing epiphanies packs another punch with vivid descriptions of the marsh, the delicate balance of nature to support the Whooping Cranes, Brown Pelicans, and Gulf Coast ecosystems. The loyalty of a lost dog and community relationships built on faith and hope complete the forecast for the return of clear blue skies along the Texas shore."

The storm has caused loss of property but no loss of life and, though the characters' paths haven't been smooth,

almost everyone finds love by the end of the book.

Diane took inspiration from the four-year rebuilding of Port Aransas in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey. She knows the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge and surrounding area well, having visited once or twice a year since the 1990's.



Music Commission explores opening park spaces for community, cultural events

The Music Commission has signaled it intends to ask the city to waive fees and streamline the administrative processes involved in allowing small community groups to hold arts and music events in local parks facilities.

The meeting in early November included discussion prompted by a request from the Sunday Sessions arts and wellness group to ask the city to waive fees for its monthly gatherings held in parks around the city. The group promotes a combination of music and creative pursuits as well as wellness activities such as yoga and guided breath work in locations such as Zilker Park.

The Sunday Sessions request referenced the fees required by the Austin Center for Events as a financial bar-

rier for the events that are free to attend. It also invoked the resolution from earlier this year, connected by the city's move to preserve the Blues on the Green concert series, that called for the city to encourage greater use of city facilities for cultural gatherings organized by small community groups.


The request, which was not voted on, also sought exploration of ways to reduce the administrative oversight needed for small gatherings "to ensure continued access to free, open-to-the-public events that promote cultural inclusivity and community engagement in Austin."

Commission members were supportive of the concept of making city spaces more available for small community and cultural gatherings but opted to hold off on making a request to City Council on behalf of one specific group. Pedro Villalobos, chair of the Parks and Recreation Board, told the Austin Monitor that financial considerations about staff needs during events and the availability of any parks spaces or facilities are the two main concerns he could foresee with the effort, along with making sure there is wide access and consideration given to all community groups.

"I'm always in favor of making sure that we're showcasing local talent that exists here in Austin and making sure that we're doing everything that we can to be supportive of local musicians and local artists and giving them space that they can perform and so that they're also able to practice and hone their craft," he said. "The question always comes down to mechanically how does it work, and making sure that everyone has access to this program or everyone has an equal opportunity to do this and that the process feels open and transparent."

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
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


