Multi-family Zoning Updates on Multiple Sites in NWACA Area an eyesore for those of us driving on Steck Avenue.

Recently our focus has been on the Acacia Cliffs rezoning case, but there are other multi-family projects in various stages of development in the Northwest Austin Civic Association area. None of these, fortunately, were as contentious as Acacia Cliffs (where the request for DB90 zoning was recently granted by City Council). They all, however, demonstrate the complexities we'll be facing as Austin becomes more urbanized.

CSW-Far West (the old Frost Bank site)

As everyone driving down Far West Boulevard east of Wood Hollow Drive can see, the CSW-Far West development is under construction. This five-story building will have 325 apartments and 6,000-square-feet of ground floor retail as well as a full range of amenities for residents.

In 2008, much of Far West Boulevard, including this site, was rezoned Vertical Mixed Use (VMU). Under the zoning granted to this site, 10% of the apartments are to be set aside as affordable housing for households earning 80% or less of the median family income (MFI). 8176 North Mopac (the old Luby's Cafeteria site)

This site has an approved site plan but at this point no construction has begun. The developer, Ardent Residential, has taken down the old Luby's building which had become

In 2021, the site was rezoned for Multi-Family-6 (MF-6) which allows for a maximum of 90 feet of height. The site plan states that the development will have 245 apartments. As part of the rezoning, the developer entered into a restrictive covenant with NWACA to have 10% of the apartments set aside as affordable housing for households earning 80% or less of the MFI. The restrictive covenant also requires above grade parking decks to be screened and specifies types of exterior building materials.

8200-8300 North Mopac

In September of 2024, this office park which is across Steck Avenue from the Luby's site was rezoned as a Community Commercial-Mixed-use Vertical Mixed-use-Density bonus 90 (GR-MU-V-DB90) site. At this point, the owner of the property has yet to file a site plan.

Under this zoning, the developer building rental units must set aside a minimum of 12% of the units as affordable to households earning 60% or less of the MFI or 10% of the units to households earning 50% or less of the MFI.

Because of the GR component of the granted zoning, Council excluded a range of potentially problematic uses from the approved zoning. The owner entered into a restrictive covenant with NWACA that, among other conditions, restricted problematic uses and established a setback from an adjacent residential area.

means absolutely nothing for anyone under the median family income in this city."

The controversy has pushed Council to reexamine DB90 in a resolution initiating amendments to its program of entitlements and concessions, which includes consideration of a one-to-one replacement of low-rent units lost to redevelopment. Council Member Marc Duchen, whose district encompasses Acacia Cliffs, says he also plans to propose a housing opportunity fund designed to preserve the city's existing affordable housing stock, a model that has seen some success in Dallas.

Still, the measures are too little too late for the residents of Acacia Cliffs and their supporters, who say that the developer-friendly approach to the housing crisis has exacerbated the displacement of low-income Austinites and eroded their trust in City Council.

"The City Council prides itself in being at the forefront of addressing the housing affordability crisis. There's been a report that the city has led in affordable housing construction in 2024, and that there were at least 4,600 affordable units built last year... but who can afford these?" said PODER Housing Justice Director Noah Elias. "You can see the Austin area median family income, which is now at \$133,800. What that means is someone making 50 percent MFI (makes) around \$66,900, while somebody making 60 percent MFI would be making around \$80,240."

"DB90 was a mistake," added Llanes. "It gives away everything that Greg Casar's beloved Affordability Unlocked promised in exchange for on-site units, and it has basically made it so that affordable developers cannot compete with this perverse incentive."

Organizers with groups like PODER and Vocal Texas have proposed their own solutions to the housing crisis, including abolishing fee-in-lieu policies that allow developers to skirt on-site unit requirements, programs like Portland's right-to-return policy for displaced East Austinites, and a low-income housing trust fund modeled after initiatives in Denver.

For now, the coalition of advocates says the case at Acacia Cliffs is another betrayal of Council's purported values.

"Mayor Watson, you know how much I respect and appreciate you...but when you were campaigning, I believe that you had door hangers that said affordability first," said Zilker Neighborhood Executive Committee member Robin Rather. "This is where the rubber meets the road."

The zoning reforms that have come to define our City Council are having a moment in the spotlight, earning shout outs from Vice President J.D. Vance and New York Times bestseller Ezra Klein, whose recent book "Abundance" presents an approach that will be familiar to most Austinites-tweaking land use code alongside market-based incentives as a way out of our affordable housing crisis. But for the hundreds of apartment tenants in Northwest Austin who will soon lose their homes to redevelopment, their city's esteem as a champion of smart housing policy couldn't seem more unearned. Despite months of tenacious organizing, the residents of Acacia Cliffs lost the battle for their

apartment complex last Thursday when Council unanimously voted to approve its rezoning under the density bonus 90 program (DB90), clearing the way for a brand new, seven-story building granted extra square feet in exchange for providing roughly 80 of its 700 proposed units at 50-60 percent of the median family income (MFI). Yet the development will also mean the loss of the 290 existing apartments offering rent at an increasingly rare 30 to 45 percent MFI, an outcome that critics say is incomprehensible under a program that, when passed last February, was framed as a means of generating affordability.

In weeks leading up to the vote, Mayor Kirk Watson took to City Council's message board and his newsletter 'The Watson Wire' to announce forthcoming reforms to the density bonus program, which he acknowledged had "unintended consequences" that "need to be addressed". Given the admission, Council's move to grant those same entitlements to the project at Acacia Cliffs left tenants and their supporters expressing outrage.

Per DB90's terms, developer Trammell Crow will reimburse displaced residents, who can expect to receive up to \$5,000 cash in moving expenses and relocation benefits for their troubles. Yet speakers say the deal is a flash in the pan considering the housing crisis faced by Austin's low -income renters.

"If any of your words about affordability mean anything, the vote here today is no... If you believe in supply and demand housing, you must vote no, because as you heard this morning, you have created fewer than 500 of the 22,000 units you need at this income level, and this would set us back by 290," said organizer Carmen Llanes, referring to city housing goals adopted in 2017. "If you approve this today, you send the message to investors and their lobbyists that the Strategic Housing Blueprint


Annual NWACA Neighborhood Garage Sales; signs and promos by NWACA for NWACA members; you keep all proceeds

You'll find two articles about the Oak Wilt Fund in this issue. One of them is our annual reminder about the availability of funds to help with oak wilt remediation, if that should be needed on your property. The other article is a public notice of a proposal to use half of the Oak Wilt Fund for a tree-related purpose of prime concern throughout the NWACA area: the abundance of wildfire fuel in our green spaces. In some cases, the green space is private property, and in some

We are in discussion with our District 10 Council Member on ways the funds might be leveraged with City funds to help mitigate risks in City-owned property, inspired by the collaborative project Marc Duchen recently led in Great Hills Park. That project coordinated efforts of the AFD Wildfire Division, Austin Parks Foundation, District 10 Office, and more than 50 individuals from Great Hills and surrounding neighborhoods (including NWACA), to remove 2,700 pounds of wildfire fuel. A Nearby Historic Gem. For Now...

The Edward H. Rogers farmstead is a historic gem, about 1.25 miles north of the neighborhood along the MoPac railroad tracks. Hidden from view by the surrounding modern business development, it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). But if you want to see it, now would be a good time as the developer wants to... well, you know. No Virginia, being on the NRHP does not protect you from being bulldozed, or in this case hopefully moved.

From the NRHP listing: "The buildings were most probably constructed by Edward H. Rogers at the time of his marriage to Sallie A. Moss in January of 1861 making [the house] one of the very few constructed in the Austin area between 1861 and 1865. Rogers and his wife first occupied the house, followed by their son Edward H. Rogers [Jr.] who lived there until his death in 1937... [the property] is a good example of the many small farmsteads once common in the rural areas around Austin."

Edward H. Rogers was the son of James Burleson Rogers, one of the original settlers of



July 2024 Road Construction Report

People living in Northwest Hills now face the possibility of encountering construction on many major highways, including Spicewood Springs Road, Loop 360, Highway 183, and I-35. All these projects have their own websites which provide frequent updates on project activities. Links to these websites have been placed on the NWACA home page.

Spicewood Springs Road

Construction is still anticipated to be completed in Winter, 2026-2027.

Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Loop 360 projects

TxDOT has projects planned along Loop 360 which will result in construction at some point along Loop 360 through 2031. The project currently under construction is a TxDOT project to remove traffic signals at Westlake Drive and Cedar Street by constructing an underpass on the Loop 360 mainlines. This work is expected to be completed mid-2026.

Another future TxDOT Loop 360 project will be at Courtyard Drive/RM222 and will replace the traffic light with a Diverging Diamond Interchange. Construction is expected to start in 2026.

Is your home safe while you're vacationing?

It's now prime time for many residents to take that well-deserved vacation. Unfortunately, there have been recent reports of break-ins at local homes via access through the overhead garage doors.


The primary ways thieves get through most overhead garage doors are by using electronic hacking systems to mimic the owner's remote opener or by disabling the emergency release which connects the garage door to the opener motor. Burglars can trigger the emergency release (typically a cord with a red handle) by fishing a coat hanger hook through the gap between the door and the door-frame. When the door is thereby released from the opener

are online illustrating this.

While unplugging or cutting the power to your door opener would stifle burglars using only hacked remote openers, it would not stop the ones using the emergency release pathway. The best way to foil both methods is to use a mechanical "dead bolt." Many newer homes have garage doors which are outfitted with a locking system that functions as a deadbolt. A simple twist of a handle "bolts" the door to both sides of the door track. These systems usually include the ability to unlock from the outside - with a key.

If your garage door does not already have some version of the deadbolt, you can get them from local hardware stores or online. The bolt mechanism is attached to your garage door and allows you to manually push the bolt into a slot in the door rail. If you want

Edwards' brother Joseph was a member of the Republic of Texas-era Texas Rangers and was killed by Indians in 1837 at today's Rogers Hill, the beginning of historic Rogers Hill Cemetery on Webberville Road, aka FM 969. This was the old "path of the pioneers," the original entry to Austin from Bastrop.



The farmstead sat just off a principal road from Austin to Burnet with stops in between. This is today's Jollyville Road on the north border of our neighborhood; the general route of today's US 183/SH 29. The farm is believed to have served as a watering stop for wagons using the road

Today the property consists of a three-room stone house (the middle room perhaps being a dog trot later enclosed), two cisterns/wells, and a two-pen barn made of gorgeous hand hewn logs on either side of a passage for the old wagons to pull through.

The farmstead is well worth a visit if only to see the barn's hand-hewn log construction (my favorite). It's located behind 10801 N. Mopac with convenient parking. Very accessible, although navigating through the maze of parking lots can be confusing.

The TxDOT project to add an overpass at Spicewood Springs Road and Loop 360 has been delayed again and now shows a 2029 date for the beginning of construction which will last 2-3 years. Until this project is completed, the City of Austin project to widen Spicewood Springs Road will have little impact on congestion since travelers will still encounter a traffic light on Loop 360.

A major question in any TxDOT projects for which construction has not yet begun is the availability of federal Department of Transportation funding.

Construction is still underway on the CTRMA 183 North Mobility Project with completion still forecast for 2026.

Burnet Road

Surprisingly, these projects are being funded by the 2016 Mobility Bond and have finally reached the construction bid stage. They are primarily smaller improvements to streets and intersections rather than adding additional lanes. One set of improvements is along Burnet north of 183, running up to the Q2 stadium (Bright Verde Way). Construction is expected to begin in the fall of 2025.

Also in the design stage, but not yet ready for construction bids is a segment from White Horse Trail to U.S 183 with construction also forecast to start in fall, 2025.

extra peace of mind, you can add a padlock to the deadbolt extended through the door rail. This will ensure that no amount of jiggling will reopen the deadbolt.

It is also highly recommended to install external motion-activated cameras and lighting to your garage and entryway to discourage would-be burglars and to notify you of unwanted activity.

Other reminders for vacationers:

- Lock all external doors AND windows
- Place a bar or broom stick in the track of sliding doors.
- Close shades or blinds on any garage door windows.
- If you leave a vehicle outside your residence, be sure to remove any remote garage door opener, and anything else of value. Leave nothing visible.
- Let your neighbors know your vacation plans, and stay in touch with them.

80+ Historical Project: Jim and Dorothy Barufaldi

When Jim and Dorothy Barufaldi moved to Austin, Northwest Hills was at its early stages. Mopac didn't exist and they were just beginning on 360. They quickly learned all the backroads to get to downtown, which even helps to this day with Austin traffic congestion.

While both were from out of state, meeting in Cleveland originally teaching school together, they made their way to Austin for Jim's job with the University of Texas. Only having been in Texas once in 1969 driving through on the way to Arizona, Dorothy remembered it being so hot and treeless in Amarillo.

"When Jim was interviewing for his job, he reassured me of the amount of trees and beauty Austin had comparatively to the Texas panhandle," Dorothy remembers.

When they were first looking for homes, they looked at neighborhoods such as Balcones Woods, but in order to get back to campus, you had to go north on 183 for awhile, then take a U turn to get back around. So life in Northwest Hills made more sense. In 1972, they moved into a tiny subdivision off Spicewood Springs Road with two streets and a cul-de-sac on Hillrise Drive.

"It's now connected to the rest of the world, but back then it was so isolated you definitely got to know the people near you," Dorothy said. "Halloween was a big treat, neighbors would do spook houses in their driveways."

Knowing they wanted to remain in Northwest Austin, they found land in Northwest Hills to start building their dream house they moved in to in October 1977, where they remain to this day.


The lot they decided to build on was steep, but luckily they found an architect in Boul-

der, Colorado to help them design it. He happened to specialize in houses that hung off canyons – a perfect fit for their future home site.

"We knew he could cope with this particular lot," Dorothy said. "With this lot they would have poured a 25-foot-deep slab and we didn't want that. So we took it to the architect and he was interested because it would be a challenge for him."

Jim and Dorothy's son, James Jr., was around 10 years old when they moved to Austin. He started at Hill Elementary in their original house, then Doss when they moved, Lucy Read 6th Grade Center, then Murchison Middle for 7th and 8th grade. For high school, however, because of Austin ISD's policy for bussing West Austin residents to East Austin schools and visa versa, their son attended Johnston High School.

"A lot of families moved away because of the bussing, but in my opinion the neighborhood got better because the





people who moved in were the people like-minded as far as we were concerned," Dorothy said. "The bussing experience was just ideal for him, it worked out terrific."

They embraced the diversity of students bussing from Northwest Hills to students who lived in East Austin - a way for students to interact who might have never been at the same school before. Parents were also instrumental in making sure they had wonderful teachers at Johnston.

"He had a PhD teacher teaching him chemistry," Jim said.

Jim knew about finding great teachers too. He taught at the University of Texas for 43 years, retiring in 2015. He was in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction as an instructor, and served as Director of the Center for Science and Mathematics Education (STEM). He ran a series of forums throughout the world for scientists and mathematicians, for example taking students to Italy for a course on Galileo. He traveled to more than 90 countries with the forums.

After Dorothy retired from a second career after teaching in engineering and Jim from UT, they continued to travel and embrace their hobbies. Jim runs a Native American Pottery facebook group that hosts around 26,000 members, also known as very "close friends," who they meet up with on some travels. Jim also wrote four books on pottery to keep busy and write.

As for advice for future Northwest Hills residents, Jim and Dorothy comment to embrace the diversity and also the architecture of the 1960s homes. There was a lot of variation in the houses when they were moving here, and with so much being knocked down and many are starting to look the same.

"The first time I saw a house lot scrapped on Burney in 2002, it was bittersweet," Dorothy said. "We've seen a lot of that happen

Also feeling nostalgia for favorite restaurants that have come and gone from Austin. Fandango's (Burnet & Anderson)-with delicious burgers & fajitas and its colorful atmosphere. And also Hai-Q on Far West, which closed more recently in 2020.


They comment on how great it is to retire in Northwest Hills with all the medical practices along the Far West so they don't have to go far for care.

"For now we are in assisted living here in our home - we assist each other," Jim said. "We thank God every day we are still here, because we are having too much fun."

Business Spotlight: Sisters SnoShack

In the 1930's New Orleans became known for the refreshing summertime phenomenon called snoballs (aka/snow balls). Now our Northwest Austin neighborhood enjoys this tasty treat at the colorful Sisters SnoShack trailer and picnic tables, tucked in the southeast corner of the Randalls shopping area on Mesa. This is where the crowds of all ages gather and who, without exception, have smiles on their faces.

Before delving into the history of Sisters SnoShack, Grace and Josh Tipps explained some distinctions in terminology. Snow cones are not snoballs -- the former has chunky pieces of ice served in a paper cone with flavored syrups sinking to the bottom; the latter is finely shaved ice which distributes the infused flavors evenly, served in a cup with a spoon.

The entrepreneurs behind the first Mesa snoball trailer, originally named Sweet Carolines, were Pat and Les Whitman. Pat and Les, formerly from New Orleans, owned the trailer where the Foulkrod sisters worked part-time throughout high school. In 2020 Jay Foulkrod, dad of the four sisters (Grace, Ruth, Ella, Ally) who lived in Northwest Hills, purchased Sweet Carolines with the hope that it would be a way that his daughters could learn to operate a business and fund their college educations. The sisters lovingly renamed it "Sisters SnoShack." In 2023, Jay sold the business to his oldest daughter Grace and her husband Josh who run it today, with the other sisters still involved in various roles.

NWACA Funds for Oak Wilt Remediation borhood project that can cost as

Throughout the years, we've provided guidance on how and when to trim oak trees in our neighborhood. We hope the information has been helpful and that your oak trees are thriving.

If, however, oak wilt does strike your trees or those of your neighbors, containing the disease is urgent and extremely important. If you suspect oak wilt, contact an oak wilt certified arborist to examine your tree and make recommendations for next steps. Search for an arborist at this site: https://isatexas.com/for-the-public/find-an-arborist/

The arborist might recommend one or more of the following techniques to contain oak wilt:

Trenching

This involves digging a trench to bedrock, a major neigh

borhood project that can cost a much as \$100,000.

<u>Infected Tree Injection (like a shot or IV for your tree)</u>

- Contract only with a Texas Oak Wilt Certified Arborist
- Recommend "macro injection" which introduces a high volume of water and chemicals into the tree's vascular system so it can be spread through the entire canopy and into new growth.

Infected Tree Removal

- Contract with a Certified Arborist or Board-Certified Master Arborist
- Remove red oaks quickly to prevent fungal mat risk (Austin City Ordinance)

NWACA can provide financial assistance to property owners dealing with oak wilt. Over the years, members have made generous donations to fund efforts to suppress the

disease in our neighborhoods. With these funds, NWACA can reimburse a homeowner's expenses up to a maximum of \$2,500. NWACA policy requires that a property owner obtain an assessment of oak wilt infection, or risk of infection in healthy oaks, from an arborist certified by the American Society of Arboriculture. (See link provided above.)

Along with the assessment, the arborist must provide an oak wilt suppression plan specifying either therapeutic treatment for infected trees or preventive treatment for at-risk healthy oaks near infected oaks. The NWACA Board of Directors may engage an independent second qualified arborist to examine the tree(s) at NWACA expense. The NWACA Board must consider and act on an oak wilt suppression plan in advance of a property owner's commitment of any expenditure for which reimbursement is requested.

Notice: Proposed Changes to Oak Wilt Fund

At its May 2025 meeting, the NWACA Board voted to put half of the Oak Wilt fund balance, as of the end of January 2026, into a fund for wildfire prevention. A program to use these funds is yet to be developed, after giving the neighborhood until the end of November 2025, to respond with any opposition.

As context: In 1997, Oak Wilt infected Rockledge Drive and several streets nearby. Neighbors in the area organized a fundraising effort to have trenches made around almost two blocks that were infected. In 1998, there was nearly \$30,000 in excess from what was given

for the trenching (including \$5,000 from the City of Austin, since it was their contracted tree trimming crew that brought in the disease on unclean tools). That money was turned over to NWACA to act as custodian. Since that date, NWACA has managed an Oak Wilt account used to reimburse neighbors who need to treat oak wilt on their property. The Oak Wilt Fund has grown to \$38,187, as of June 1, 2025. In the decades since the fund was established, several thousand dollars have been paid out, but in recent years there have been very few requests for reimbursements.

Carton Recycling and More

A recent press release from the City of Austin and Austin Resource Recovery explains some new items that Austinites can now recy-

"City of Austin curbside customers can now recycle food and beverage cartons and coated paper products in their blue recycling carts.

Cartons, also known as aseptic or gable top containers, are often used to package items like milk, juice, protein drinks, soup and creamers. Coated paper products include cups used for hot coffee and other beverages, paper plates and takeout food containers.

Recycling cartons and paper cups will help reduce the amount of waste Austinites send to landfills. The paper products are coated with a layer of material which makes them resistant to moisture and more durable. This coating can be made from various materials, including plastics like polyethylene or wax.

Recycling cartons and paper cups also saves our natural resources, supports a circular economy, and reduces Austin's environmental footprint. Recycled paper products can be turned into paper towels, tissues, office paper, roof tiles and other sustainable materials. Paper made from recycled fibers creates 35% less water pollution and 74% less air pollution than paper made from raw wood pulp.

Residential curbside customers can learn more about what material is recyclable in their blue carts at www.austintexas.gov/recycling"

Austin has a goal to reach zero waste by 2040. Recycling paper plates, paper cups, ice cream containers, coffee cups, milk cartons and other similar containers reduces the amount of trash sent to the landfill. Please be aware that these items that are now being recycled are made from paper. Styrofoam cups and plates should be collected and taken to the Recycle and Reuse Dropoff Center (1520 Rutherford Lane, 78754) along with your Styrofoam egg cartons, take-home containers, and trays that come with your meat or fish purchases. Styrofoam is not recycled nor is it trash. Another drop off spot is the Styrofoam recycling bin in the Anderson High School parking lot.

Coffee cups, like those from Starbucks, often have a plastic top on them. Now that you can recycle your coffee cup you can leave the top on to recycle the entire cup. Please remember that Austin Resource Recovery asks that you leave the cap on your plastic water bottle when recycling as well.

Neighbor Tip: What to Flush

At the Mick Koffend Earth Day Celebration this spring, Austin Water had a display where attendees could experiment with how toilet paper breaks down versus what happens with "flushable" wipes. The experiment clearly showed that wipes which claim to be flushable really austinwater.org don't break down easily. Studies have shown that even after traveling for 30 minutes through the sewer system, the wipes are still fully intact. That means they can get hung up in any rough spots in aging pipes or in tight bends through the pipes. Toilet paper, on the other hand, is engineered to break down quickly in water, so it's unlikely to get caught up in household plumbing or in the City sewer system.

When the wrong thing gets flushed, it can result in expensive repairs for a household or cause problems in the City of Austin sewer and wastewater treatment system. According to Austin Water, the biggest sources of sewer overflows and backups are rags, debris, and wipes.

These items should go into the trash can, never flushed down the toilet: Baby wipes, cleaning wipes, paper towels, tissues, dental floss, face cleaning pads, cotton balls, ear swabs, diapers, pills, hair, and cooking grease.



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





